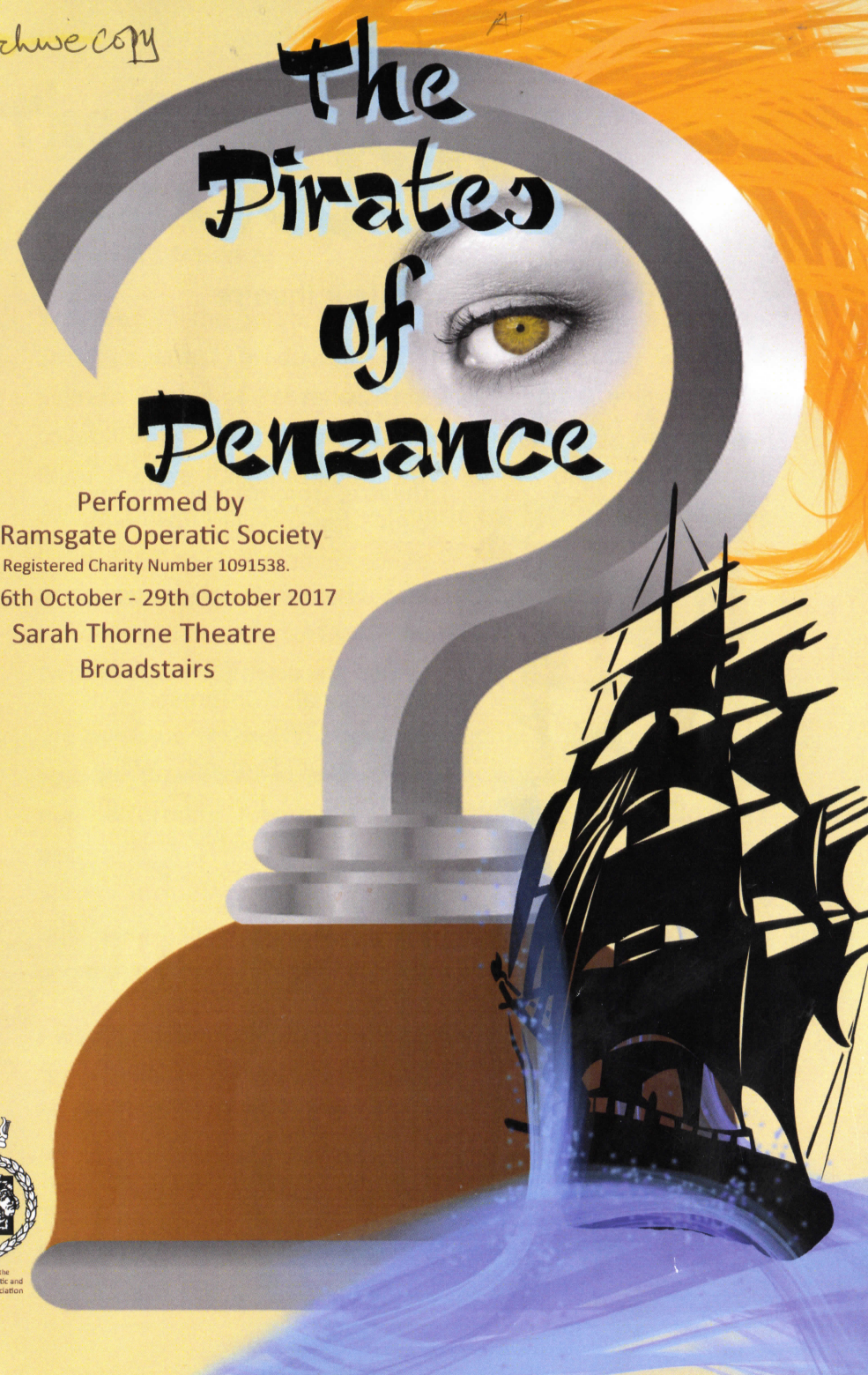

This was Gilbert & Sullivan's fifth collaboration, the first performances being given at the Royal Bijou Theatre Paignton and on the 30th of December and the 31st of December 1879 to establish copyright; Gilbert having been most upset by the loss of royalties from 'pirated' performances of HMS Pinafore in the United States. As 'Pirates' is no longer in copyright we have given the production a new twist that we hope you will enjoy.

Synopsis

At the opening of Act One, we join the pirates in their hideout on the seashore near Penzance as they celebrate Frederick's coming of age. His nursemaid, Ruth, explains that she mistakenly indentured Frederick to a pirate instead of to a pilot, but Frederick forgives her even though he abhors by their evil trade, because it was his duty under his indentures. Frederick is left alone on the beach whereupon the Major General's daughters now appear, one of which immediately falls in love with Frederick. He explains that he is now free from his indentures and will put an end to the pirates evil trade even if this can only be achieved by their extermination. The pirates now appear and are about to carry off the other sisters as brides when the Major General appears and begs them not to take his daughters away on the pretext that he is an orphan, knowing that the infamous Pirates of Penzance will not harm an orphan, and so relinquish their claims.

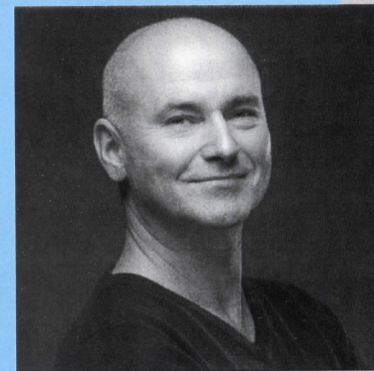
Act Two opens with the Major General surrounded by his daughters in the ruined chapel of his recently purchased home lamenting that he escaped the pirates clutches by falsely claiming to be an orphan to the dishonour of his ancestors. Frederick consoles him by telling him he will atone for his past by sweeping the pirates from the face of the earth. Whereupon the local policemen enter lead by their sergeant who extols their virtues and bravery in song before marching off to prepare for their encounter with the pirates. Frederick, left alone, is now approached by the Pirate Queen and Ruth who point out that as he was born on the 29th February and whilst he has lived 21 years, counting by birthdays he is only 5 and a little bit over and his apprenticeship is until his 21st birthday! Frederick, driven by his sense of duty, feels compelled to re-join the pirates and tells of the Major General's false claim to be an orphan and his plan for the policemen to capture the pirates, who, forewarned, defeat the police and capture the Major General. But good must prevail and when the Major General bids the pirates yield in the name of Queen Victoria they do so and forsaking their vile profession marry the Major General's daughters and return to their roles as members of the House of Lords.



For all performances, Mr. Baker was replaced by Mr. R. Drywood.

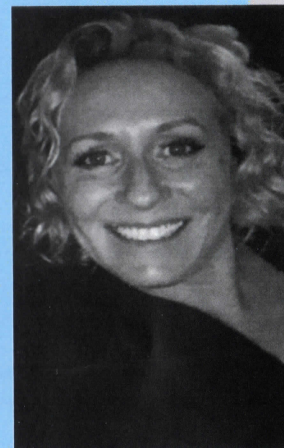
Tim Baker – Musical Director

Sarah Matthews – Choreographer

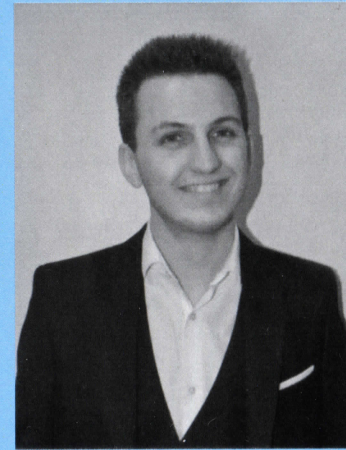

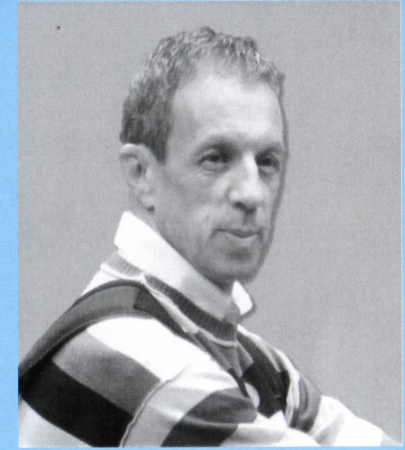

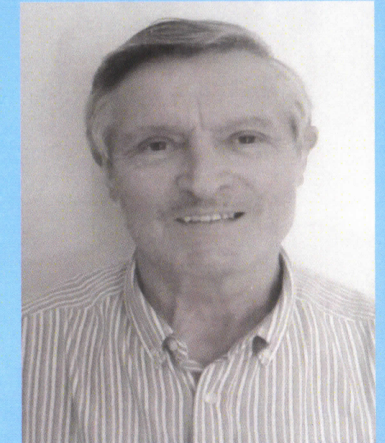
