The opera, written by a beggar, is meant to depict the distinction between the manner and extent of the punishment regularly meted out to the poor as opposed to the rich. Mr. Peacham, the fence, buys and sells on booty robbed by highwaymen from stage coach travellers but he is also very likely to betray them to the authorities for a £40 reward without any compunction. His accomplice in these nefarious deeds is Lockit, the jailor of Newgate prison. Polly Peacham declares to Mrs. Peacham that she is already married to MacHeath, the leader of the highway men. The Peachams decide to betray MacHeath, who then finds himself in Newgate jail.

In Act 2, Lucy Lockit discovers MacHeath in jail. She loves him too. The fact is, MacHeath loves all women and associates frequently with the whores in the local tavern. Lucy obtains the keys from Lockit and frees him. However MacHeath is re-captured by the simple device that Peacham uses frequently, namely palming money to his collaborators. At the conclusion of the opera, MacHeath is reprieved from the gallows, just in time, much to he However MacHeath is re-captured by the simple device that Peacham uses frequently, namely palming money to his collaborators. At the conclusion of the opera, MacHeath is reprieved from the gallows, just in time, much to he chagrin of the beggar. However even he becomes corrupted when Peacham points out to him that the play could be repeated and royalties would be payable, much to the financial advantage of the beggar. So the beggar is no better at moralising than any of the other characters in the play.

Mostly more familiar to those who know as NODA, the Association has over 2800 amateur theatre groups in membership across Great Britain and Northern Ireland as a whole. It acts as the representational body for non-professional theatre in all areas that affects its activities: political lobbying, health and safety, legal and technical issues, provision of training courses in abundance and so on. Its activities contribute more than £80,000,000 to the national and regional economies. It is also a self-help organisation in that it has a very good networking arrangement whereby groups stuck for props, scenery, costumes and so on can readily find what they want through the local and national contacts. Our secretary is currently the Councillor for SE England and Sylvia Blogg is the local regional representative (both perform their functions in an honorary capacity), as is the case with everyone involved in amateur theatre—.

THANET ARTS COUNCIL

Under its Chairman, Marion Evans, TAC is a lifeline and promoter of ARTS in Thanet. It stages a series of exhibitions, courses and events throughout the year intended to bring ART in all its forms to the people of Thanet. Its ARTS SHOWCASE, which is a major exhibition of art in Thanet, is an event that we support. TAC meets once a month and we are active members of it.

D'OYLY CARTE OPERA TRUST

The Trust keeps alive the works of Gilbert and Sullivan. It is also a source of scores and band parts for many Societies across Great Britain. Regionally it supports a number of Gilbert and Sullivan Societies, the nearest of which is based in Brighton. We support the Trust financially and in return we receive a regular newsletter and access to the hire department for scores, band parts and libretti.

JOHN GAY AND THE OPERA

The Beggar's Opera is one of the great success stories in the history of the London stage. The original play opened at the Playhouse in Lincoln's Inn Fields on 29th. January 1728 and ran for 62 performances in the first season, smashing all previous records. It was remarkable at the time for its originality. The title "Opera", to an audience in the 1720s, meant the Italian opera which first appeared in London in 1705 and which had been much in vogue ever since. The Italian operas were known for their sumptuous costumes and the sophistication of their "special effects", the credibility of the story line coming a poor second. Their plots were usually taken from myth or legend, with the hero triumphing over evil to effect a happy ending. Not so The Beggar's Opera, which, by contrast, held a mirror to the low life and seedy underworld of contemporary London.

All the characters in the play are either highwaymen, crooks, pickpockets, fences or whores (some being a combination of many of these). Even Polly knows full well the profession of her "husband" and parents. The punishment for highway robbery was, at the time, death by hanging. In fact capital punishment was dealt with for over eighty offences, including stealing more than a shilling from a person, five shillings or more from a shop, four shillings or more from a house or any smaller amount if the offence was carried out with menaces. In 1706 an Act was passed encouraging criminals to inform on their accomplices- if they turned them in and a conviction was achieved, the informer received a free pardon and a reward. This had the effect of bringing into being a class of professional informers called "thief catchers". Peacham is one of these.

"Life is jest; and all things know it. I thought so once; but now I know it"

John Gay's irreverent epitaph, penned in his own words, was a final jibe from a man who had served London as poet, playwright, satirist, social critic and jester-at-large. Death claimed him prematurely in 1732 but not before he had written his Beggar's Opera, the first real English ballad opera and, by almost any measure, the most popular English theatre work of the 18th Century. The work was also influential. Victorian operetta and musical comedy reopened and enlarged a path pioneered by Gay a century and a half before.

The play was reputed to be George Washington's favourite stage work. In fact in the 1750s the play

The play was reputed to be George Washington's favourite stage work. In fact in the 1750s the play was as popular in the American Colonies as it was in England. Frequent adaptions, a film version and FREQUENT REVIVALS ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ATLANTIC - MOST NOTABLY THAT AT THE LYRIC THEATRE LONDON IN 1920 - HAVE KEPT THE WORK BEFORE THE PUBLIC EVER SINCE.
